Board Meeting Highlights of 6/22/19:

News N Notes Editor/Collegiate Contest Chair: We still need volunteers to become PRA's News N Notes newsletter editor, and PRA's JDC Collegiate Contest chair. Meanwhile, Laura Bridges and Amanda Partridge will help Donna with the News N Notes. If you are interested in volunteering for either role, contact President Frieda Patton or Chair Donna Smith.

2019 Anthology Update: 100 books were ordered at the beginning of distribution, and 25 more were ordered later for Kate to sell at NFSPS. She has about 20 left.

Old Anthologies: The number of remaining vintage anthologies and suggestions for distribution were discussed. A motion was passed to give 5 sets of the vintage anthologies to the State Library so that copies may be checked out. A list of the vintage anthologies will be posted on the website for sale at a flat rate of \$1 plus postage if mailed. Distribution of these books is a way of promoting PRA. A motion was made to donate some of the vintage anthologies to the White County Creative Writers Conference donation table

<u>Manningham Student Contest Report</u> – Laura Bridges reported that there was confusion this past year because some student winners placed multiple times. Students are allowed to enter only one poem and this is expected to be clarified in next year's contest rules.

<u>Webmaster</u>: The board approved Karalin Rogers to continue as webmaster for the new fiscal year at the same rate of \$500/year.

<u>Board Member-at-Large Vacancy</u>: Kate Lacy submitted her resignation as member-at-large due to a planned move out of state. Nominations were considered. Christine Henderson of Gin Creek Branch was elected to fill the position.

Merit Award vote: Nominees for the 2019 Merit Award were discussed and a secret ballot taken. The Merit Award winner will be announced at Poetry Day.

Friends came from Little Rock and other parts of the state, but also from Kansas City; Milledgeville, Georgia; Pittsburg, Kansas; Dallas; and Ireland. Frieda Patton (PRA President) was raised a farmer's daughter at Des Arc, Arkansas. She grew up helping with the 2000-3000 chicken farm and spent summers cutting sprouts, picking up chunks, or driving the tractor in the fields. After graduation, she moved to Little Rock, immediately began work for the State of Arkansas at age 17 and retired after 38 years. She worked as a secretary for 11 years for Rehabilitation Services and 27 years for the Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ). She was assistant to the Director's Office of ADEQ for 20 years and was also manager of the Asbestos and Lead programs for 6 of those years. She later managed the budget, grants, and personnel issues for the Air Division. She met Dennis in Little Rock and married in 1971. They have a son, daughter and son-in-law, and 2 granddaughters, who live nearby. Her time is split among church activities, the granddaughters' activities, and PRA. Frieda was introduced to poetry by Dennis and serves as his critic and encourager. She served on PRA's Board as a member-at-large for the last 4 years.

Dr. Laura Trigg (PRA Vice President) is pleased to be a new board member of PRA. She has written poems since elementary school but rarely shared them until she met Karen Hayes at a poetry reading at Vino's in 2014. A few months later she braved her first meeting and found a poetry home. Her writing has improved through their monthly critique sessions, and she was encouraged by fellow members to enter contests. She feels lucky to have placed in several. She is primarily a weekend poet and a weekday physician, trying to carve out more time for writing. She lives with her husband, Dave, a retired teacher, and their dog, Steven. They have two fabulous adult children, Anna and Peter.

Amanda Partridge (PRA Secretary): AJ Partridge is a tea enthusiast and a cat lady. Currently pursuing her JD/MPA, AJ snatches moments between classes to write a few lines. Dennis Patton (PRA Treasurer, Counselor and Past President) has enjoyed poetry from early childhood

because his mother read to her children as they grew up in rural Arkansas, near Clarksville. He became a member of Saline County branch of Poets' Roundtable of Arkansas (PRA) in 2005 after moving from Little Rock to Alexander. He saw a weekly poetry column in the Saline Courier which included an invitation to all who enjoyed or wrote poetry. He currently serves as editor of the Saline Courier's "Poets Forum" and president of the branch. He retired from ABF in 2003. He is an avid fisherman and hunter, which has been a boon to his writing. Along with gun, coffee, and sandwich, he carries pen, pad, and newspaper puzzle to the deer stand. The solitude in nature serves as a rare enticement to his pursuit. Often, he struggles with the difficult choice of hunting or finishing a poem. His love for poetry has led him to recognize life is too short to be without poetry and he shares in hope to inspire others.

Renee Ramsey (PRA Historian): Renee Ramsey has been reading and writing poetry since elementary school. She also enjoys painting and jewelry making. She resides in the Ozark foothills with her husband, Danny and her 16 pound cat, Hissyfit.

John McPherson (PRA Parliamentarian): John is a retired Manager for the United States Postal Service. Since retirement he has served as a tax aide for both Jackson Hewitt Tax Services and AARP. She now co-chairs that committee. She is President of the River Market group and has been the Strophes Reporter for the last 10 years. When she is not working or writing, she enjoys spending time with her family, especially her 19 year-old daughter. Laura has a BA in Commercial Art with a minor in Communications from Ouachita Baptist University. She and her daughter live in North Little Rock.

Fay Smalling Guinn (Board Member-at-Large) grew up in North Little Rock. After graduating with a degree In English education she taught in Memphis while putting her husband through medical school and living down the street from Elvis. In a trailer beside a salvage yard. When both her parents passed away 7 years ago she rediscovered her love of creative writing. She saw a photo and caption about a writers group in the local paper and attended the next meeting. The rest, as they say, is history. Through the group she learned of conferences, retreats and contests. Attending workshops in Wyoming, Missouri, Nashville, Memphis, Oregon, and all over Arkansas (especially Hemingway-Pfeiffer Writers Retreat in Piggott) has honed her skills, provided publishing, performing, speaking, and contest

opportunities. She has won over 100 writing awards in poetry and prose. For the last 42 years she has called Jonesboro, Arkansas home with her retired husband. Recently she celebrated the birth of the third son of her third son. She is currently seeking a publisher for a poetry collection, *Don't Wear Red While Sitting Outside With Birds*, and a memoir, *Mrs. Guinn Is an H.O.E.*

Christine Henderson (Member-at-Large): Christine Gayle Glass Henderson writes as Gayle Glass. After a divorce in 1994, she joined White County Creative Writers (WCCW) in Searcy, AR to re-invent herself. Her writing has garnered awards nationwide, and she has been published in anthologies such as Writing on Walls, White County Creative Writers' Park Tales and Who We Are. Chris was an online poetry editor for Writers' Village University for 2 years in 1997-1998, has held all offices and managed writers' workshops for WCCW, facilitated a workshop for Arkansas Tourism travel writers, and published a chapbook titled *Having* Fun, plus a beginners' writing guide called Between the Lines. In addition, she produced a blog titled The Looking Glass, wrote newsletters for various corporations, plus newspaper and magazine articles. She has given lectures on poetry to various writing groups in the state. She was one of the founders and the first President of PRA's Gin Creek Poets branch. In her day job her left brain focuses on keeping up with DOT regulations, taxes, permits, and payroll for the trucking department of a manufacturer in Searcy.

Donna Smith (Board Member-at-Large): Donna has loved poetry and the written word since she was a child. Late in life she began writing poetry as gifts for special occasions. She joined PRA in 2005 to improve her work, and continues to be surprised whenever she wins a contest, especially when she won the Sybil Nash Abrams competition. She has served PRA in various roles, including: Poetry Day Chair, Poetry Day Contest Chair, Spring Celebration Chair, Newsletter Editor, Collegiate Contest Chair, and State Fair Contest Chair. She also won PRA's Merit Award in 2016 for her various efforts to promote poetry and PRA. Donna was raised in Mtn. Home, AR, except for a few elementary school years in Kansas City, MO. She earned a Business Education degree from Missouri State University, and moved back to Arkansas where she served several financial roles in Arkansas State Government and private industry in Little Rock. Her last and longest tenure was 27 years as Director of Finance & Administration for the Arkansas Educational Television Network (AETN). She retired from AETN 6 years ago, and enjoys gardening, crafts, and spending time with her husband Tom, 2 daughters, 3 grandkids, and her 91-year-old Mom who still lives in Mtn. Home.
