Meet New PRA Member Bílly Sayles

My name is Capt'n Billy Sayles. The captain part is from my past. I



skippered charter yachts in the Pacific NW and the Caribbean. Growing up land-locked in Iowa, it was my childhood dream to be a sea captain. Those years gave me plenty to write about. Now that I'm retired. Most folks just call me 'Uncle' Billy these days.

I was introduced to poetry in an embarrassing way. It was eighth grade.

Every student had to write a poem (ugh, that girly stuff) and then stand and recite on Friday. I went home, pulled all the dusty books off my parent's shelves, to ah.... get inspired. When it was my turn on Friday, nervously began, "I never thought I'd ever see... a poem as lovely as a tree..."

"Did you write that?" Sister Dolores asked. I couldn't lie to her. She was a nun for Christ's sake.

"No Sister, I did not."

"Billy, you will write, 'I will not plagiarize ever again' one-hundred times in neat cursive and place it on my desk Monday morning."

I never, ever plagiarized again. Never. Never more... quoth the raven:) Poets who later won my admiration: Edgar Allen Poe, Robert Frost, Paul Simon, Shakespeare, Billy Collins.

As for revisions? Yes. Over and over again. The best tool for this is reading your work to yourself, out loud. Then read it again to

someone else. If they make terrible faces at you, you should start over.

I am a member of the Hot Springs Haiku Club, Rotary International, Old Time Fiddlers Association and

Five states / South Region Coordinator for the Haiku Society of America. It is through haiku that I have met many wonderful poets. At one of our haiku meetings, I was introduced to **Marie Allison** who invited me to join the Poets' Roundtable of Arkansas. Thank you Marie.

A little about Haiku. What a challenge each poem becomes. Compressing your wonderful long story into three lines, seventeen syllables (more or less) takes some practice. Here's one I wrote recently:

no rain just wait gasps dry stream I'll sing in spring

The PRA Board met on January 18, 2025. Spring Celebration details were determined. (See article above.) **Suzanne Rhodes** volunteered to find a speaker for the Spring Celebration program.

John McPherson volunteered to be Poetry Day Contest Chair. Poetry Day Chair, date, and venue are still to be determined. Poetry Day contests' criteria were determined as follows: O'Neal Memorial Award—subject: any; form: any; line limit: 32; O'Neal Humor Award—subject: south; form: any; line limit: 24. Sybil Nash Abrams Award—subject: Gangsters and Outlaws in Arkansas; form: any; line limit: 60-100. John Crawford will be the Sybil Nash Abrams Contest Chair.

Two motions were passed regarding banking. They were: A motion that after PRA Spring Celebration in April, the treasurer have approval to have **Dennis Patton** and **John McPherson** removed as signatories on the two First Financial checking accounts and the two Schwab money market accounts and to add the new president on all accounts.

A motion that the treasurer be authorized to close the two checking accounts at First Financial and open two new accounts at a new bank of the treasurer's choice if it is determined by the treasurer to be in the best interest of PRA.

Poetry Day Contest changes were suggested and approved and will be reflected in the 2025 yearbook:

6. All poems must be original, unpublished work of the poet. First place winning poems MAY NOT BE RESUBMITTED to the same contest for which they won that award. PRA defines publication as having an ISBN or ISSN.

Arkansas Poet Laureate Series

Since 1923 when the position was established, the Arkansas Poet Laureate was appointed by the legislature and it was a lifetime appointment. So when Rosa Zagnoni Marinoni died in 1970, then Governor Winthrop Rockefeller named Ercil Brown interim laureate because the legislature was not in session. When they were back in session, they were given three nominees for the position: Anna Nash Yarbrough, Lily Peter, and Ercil Brown. But instead of selecting one, the legislature decided to pass Act 90 in 1971 which assigned the responsibility of appointing a poet laureate to the governor. Act 90 reads, "The person designated or appointed by the Governor as Poet Laureate of the State of Arkansas shall be a person whose name was selected from a list of names submitted to the Governor upon recommendation of a committee consisting of the principal heads of the English departments of all statesupported universities and colleges." The position remained a lifetime appointment. By 1971, a new governor had been elected. Governor Dale Bumpers announced Lily Peter as Arkansas Poet Laureate in October of 1971.

Lily Peter was born in 1891 in Phillips



County. She was the first of ten children, (five did not survive), so when her father died from an accident on the farm, she became responsible for the financial care of her

family. Her education was informal until she moved to Ohio to live with relatives and attend high school where she graduated valedictorian. She became a teacher and though she struggled on that salary, she

continued managing the farm. She was successful enough to buy another farm with her brother. After his death, she carried on with teaching and taking care of what was now thousands of acres of cultivated land. She dabbled in organic farming and was a leader in conservation and environmental issues. Peter studied English at Columbia and Vanderbilt universities and violin at Julliard. She was considered a philanthropist and a financial supporter of the arts, financing the college education of students and donating money to build the Lily Peter Auditorium in Helena, Arkansas. She received national notice on ABC News and in Look magazine for her promotion of fine arts in the state. She was a writer all of her life with much of it about the Arkansas Delta. Her publications include: The Green Linen of Summer, The Great Riding, The Story of De Soto in America, In the Beginning: Myths of the Western World, and The Sea Dream of the Mississippi. Lily Peter died in 1991 and is buried in Turner Cemetery southwest of Helena. You can find many of her papers and taped interviews in the archives at the University of Central Arkansas in Conway. I wrap my thoughts in the green linen of summer


Against the terror of the dragon wind, And pray that the linen may not too soon be thread-/

journal: the juncos (Oct. 30 2024), the first green tips of crocuses poking through (second week of January), and today, January 28, the coo-coo of a mourning dove calling for a mate (you know what they say about the early bird!). And new arrivals come with poetry too: PRA member LaDeana Mullinex's forthcoming chapbook *Small Comforts* to be released this spring by Kelsay Books, my daughter Emily Robyn Clark's chapbook Morning Comes Roaring Down the Mountain with a fall publication date from Finishing Line Press. and the many poems among our members that have won contests or found homes in journals and books. Everything that lands is announcing, "I'm here!"

One of my greatest rewards as our state poet laureate and as a teacher of poetry is seeing its impact on others. To share one example, I have a very smart friend who crunches numbers in her career and goes on walks during her lunch break. She read poems from my book *Flying Yellow* and told me that on a recent walk among the trees lining the buildings of her workplace she noticed the smell of pine needles for the first time and said it was my poems that awakened this in her. I was completely blown away by her words. She confirmed my belief that poetry is a gift to be given, like a dandelion puff caught by wind that sends the seeds sailing.

Many good things have been happening since my last column. I had wonderful experiences of teaching middle schoolers at



the New School and high school juniors who study with Classical

Conversations, both groups in Fayetteville. I was thrilled to be named the Individual Artist of the year in the Governors Arts Awards for 2025 sponsored by the Arkansas Arts Council and will be honored on March 7 in Little Rock. Some of you have bought tickets to attend this special event, and I'm SO excited and grateful that you're coming! Here's more information about the luncheon. You are all invited.

Another very recent blessing is that I've been awarded a \$5,000 scholarship to attend the C. S. Lewis Summer Institute in Belfast, Ireland in July! My ancestral homeland! And the theme is "Home!" I've never been to the UK before and this will be a wonderful opportunity to learn and grow intellectually and spiritually, form new friendships, and experience all sorts of new things to inspire my poetry. *Moladh duit a Dhia* is Gaelic for "Praise to you, oh God." I'll be going with my friend Margret Walker, whom some of you know for her fine poetry.

Other news: in February I'll be reading with Jake Stratman, John Brown University poet and professor, at the Faulkner County Library in Conway (Feb. 16), then going to Harding University Feb. 17-19 at the invitation of **Paulette Guerin Bane** to teach

her creative writing class and give a reading later that afternoon or evening. I'll also have a chance to meet with students at the local high school for a poetry workshop. I'm involved in a collaborative project with **Michael Blanchard** called ArtVerse with the Conway League of Artists where artists choose from among three of our poems to inspire paintings and which will culminate in an awards luncheon.

I have recent work in *Southern Voices: Fifty Contemporary Voices* (Lamar University Press), *Slant: A Journal of Poetry*, and *Valley Voices* (Mississippi Valley State University) and am continuing to work on my third full collection.

May this New Year be fruitful and wordful for every one of you who loves and appreciates poetry. I look forward to seeing you at Spring Celebration in April!

From the Editor

I am making more of an effort to write poetry this year. I wouldn't call it a resolution exactly. I just know that writing poetry is part of who I am. Since retiring, I've found new hobbies and interests that give my creativity an outlet. Maybe that has softened the urgency to write poems although I'm inspired daily and nightly by my surroundings here in the Ozarks. To "kickstart" this effort, I signed up for a talk by Naomi Shihab Nye called "When a Poem Becomes a True Friend." It was sponsored by 27 Powers with Laurie Wagner. It was 90 minutes of inspiration listening to Naomi read poems that she has loved and read over and over again since she was in her teens. One was by W.S. Merwin; another by William Stafford; there was one by Lucille Clifton. She also gave us a

minute or two to respond to prompts inspired by the poems she read. She described her daily writing practice and talked about how she handwrites on different size paper, free writing with no editor. Only later when she types her thoughts does she edit and revise. I recently registered for Hellbender Gathering of Poets' event called "The First Answer Is Love: A Valentine to the Earth" with guest Tierra Curry from the Center for Biological Diversity. It offers in-person and Zoom participation making it easy for me to attend. I imagine it will blend my Master Naturalist interests and my poetry writing. I hope to attend my first NFSPS National Convention in Albuquerque this July where Naomi Shihab Nye will be the keynote speaker. Other ways I'm encouraging my poetry writing are: entering PRA's monthly and special events' contests; reconnecting with a friend in San Francisco who I've never met in person, but with whom I share drafts of my poetry. (We "met" years ago in a Kim Addonizio online workshop.); making sure I'm reading Rattle and the stacks of poetry books, some by PRA members. You can find a list of PRA members' books here:
